Daytime Activities

As you think about daytime activities, here are some suggestions of things to do in Pittsburgh:

1. Some neighborhoods have changed dramatically since 1970. Consider wandering around one of them:

Squirrel Hill's transition to a large Asian population is obvious from a walk down Forbes or Murray. There are only 3 stores left on Forbes from 1970 - PNC bank, the

Squirrel Hill Cafe and the newsstand. Test your Chinese language skills at some of the new bakeries and grocery stores.

The Strip District has transformed to a popular residential and shopping area. It is the place to go for Perogies, donuts, cheese and Steeler garb.

Lawrenceville has a large collection of trendy bars and restaurants. It's where the Pittsburghers in their 20s want to live.

2. Segway tours of the downtown area are available starting at Station Square. Here is the link:

- 4. The old sites are still there including the Carnegie and Frick museums, Frick and Schenley Parks, the Phipps Conservatory, a completely transformed Carnegie Mellon and a surprisingly little changed Pitt.
