# **THE LEGEND OF THE COUGATEERS**

Are you sitting at home, feet propped up, drinking another cold one? Good for you. You deserve it. You've worked hard in life.

But for the 17 months leading up to our 50-Year Reunion, it wasn't quite so easy-going for our Cougateers. In far flung cities where fans moved warm air that smelled of jasmine in the summer, rest for the weary didn't come until late at night. Seated behind gleaming computer monitors, three women with green-and-gold running through their veins — Beth Gault, in Grove City, OH; Kathy Miller, in Sebring, FL; and Dawn Eberst Lucas in Greenville, SC — were unable to relax. Their backs were killing them. Their fingers had gone numb. Their blurry stares had begun to go cross-eyed.

Welcome to a day in the life of our Cougateers leading up to the Reunion, women who put it all on the line for us day after day, month after month. They gave new meaning to the Three Musketeers slogan, "All for one and one for all." For 'all' of them were searching for that 'one' classmate who snuck away and no one could find. Each 'one' of them gave their 'all' for us, which is how we created a classmate database with 725 mailing addresses, 639 phone numbers and 566 email addresses.

Oh Homer, if only you could be here now to honor these modern day heroines with another long poem. Your new screed would outshine the *Iliad* and the *Odyssey*, and perhaps become required reading in Florida civics classes one day.

How did these modern conquistadors develop a classmate database to begin with, you wonder? Did Kathy, held aloft in her wheel chair by piano wire, descend from the heavens with sacred tablets? Did Dawn hack into the Killian mainframe and route our names through Wikileaks? Perhaps Beth donned a wetsuit and brought up this treasure from the bottom of Biscayne Bay? Nothing so

grand. It technically all started when we launched our Facebook page and solicited a few hundred names and addresses. But it wasn't until Dawn jumped in that our database sprouted wings and flew.

Dawn reviewed all 823 classmates in our 1975 Catamount yearbook and typed in the 600+ names that were missing on our list. She reviewed the 765 people on the graduation list that Carol Carver Harris secured from Killian back in 1984, a list Killian no longer makes available, and added about 400 more. She folded in a few dozen more from our commencement announcement, and this past month, Dawn even added the names of juniors from the 1974 Catamount who did not graduate with us (but should have). The last additions swelled our database from 1,142 to 1,292 classmates.

Although the sweat off Dawn's brow could fill a ten-gallon aquarium, it was only a start. We still needed contact information. But how? Word of mouth contributed mightily, thanks to many of our graduates. We started by reaching out via Facebook, often with classmate invites, to anyone whose profile seemed to be a match. That worked for a while, until the well ran dry. Another source was Carol Carver Harris, whose vision and tenacity fired our class spirit in every Class Reunion to date.

But even these early outreach efforts were just a start, contributing perhaps 25% to all of the contact info we have collected to date. We still had 950 names to investigate, and like a pile of kindling waiting for a spark, that's when Kathy, our Outreach Committee "Chair," jumped into the ring and kick-started the great crusade that stretched on for over a year. Kathy took over the research arm and dredged up every possible clue for Dawn to try to contact, even as Paula (Finkelstein) Rosenberg and Beth joined her, ignoring calls this was supposed to be a tag team sport. It became a wrestling match made-for-TV moment instead as all four of them piled into the ring together.

Eventually, Paula withdraw for personal reasons. It boiled down to just the three. And as these ladies emailed each other in the darkness, slap happy and silly after hours of tedious labor to find lost classmates in a world gone mad with technology and contradictory news broadcasts, that's when the nickname struck — the Cougateers — and that's where it shall be forever more. They touched swords through the ether of cyber space, and in that one moment late at night on the edge of sleep and sweet oblivion, they were forever relegated to the chapters of Killian lore where our common tutorage was transformed into blood and no one turned their back on family anymore.

The song was the brainchild of **Rick Leinecker**, who composed the first draft, wrote the music, sang lead vocals, and mixed the final recording. **Robin Ruddy** and **Kim Sestok Kushner** recorded background vocals, and Robin played rhythm guitar. The song was rewritten and recorded several times before the lyrics were approved by classmates that also included **Julius Szalay**, **Keith Spurlock**, **Doug Traub** and **Ritchie Williams**.

Work on the project began in May of 2024. A broad net was cast to find the best musicians in our class to collaborate on the project. Monthly meetings were held on Zoom to discuss lyrics and composition. 


That's So Miami Killian! by Kandy McKenzie Hill

Then there is sun and fun at Matheson Hammock Beach And you see all the hot "guys" and lose your speech


So it's on to Big Daddy's for a "beat the clock" night Dressed to the hilt with that mini skirt tight
























# Back in our day:

- Elementary School encompassed Grades 1-6;
- Junior High School encompassed Grades 7-9; and
- High School encompassed Grades 10-12 (+ or -).

During the late 60s, Kindergarten was added to the elementary school continuum, which meant that most of us either attended private school kindergarten or not at all! There was some shape-shifting during the 70s among the grade-level configurations of junior and senior high schools; however, those adjustments were a tool for managing school over-crowding due to suburban sprawl. Based on educational research, beginning in the 80s, the "middle school" concept emerged where this newly-christened model commenced serving Grades 6-8, followed by 9-12 in high school.

Killian was a bit of a unicorn in the 70s in that it served Grade 9 students for a brief moment in time. Many of us were among that group of students who commenced Grade 9 at Killian during the 1971-72 academic year. We were so young and a bit intimidated to be the small fish in a big sea. On the up-side, there was also a cool factor about being on a big campus at that tender age, even though it meant having to sacrifice our top-dog status as ninth graders at our respective junior high schools. Whenever you landed at Killian, most of us arrived from either Glades or Richmond Heights junior high schools.

Killian's feeder junior high schools still offered Grade 9, but where you lived determined whether you attended ninth grade at your assigned junior high school or at Killian. After the 1971-72 academic year, Killian ceased offering Grade 9 until the middle school movement took hold in the 80s, which uniformly relegated ninth grade to senior high.

So, where did you attend junior high school (now middle school) class of '75? Based on an unscientific Facebook poll, what follows are the junior high schools our classmates attended—in some cases, more than one!



Senior Prom: <u>The Way We Were</u> By Michael Bell

Michael's post was seen by 153 classmates on Facebook, generating 22 "likes" and 8 comments.

If memory serves me correctly, Killian's Class of '75 senior prom was originally scheduled to take place at the Coconut Grove Hotel. That plan fell through at the 11th hour and our last-minute "Plan B" was to host prom in the Country Club Ballroom at the Biltmore Hotel in Coral Gables. Bear in mind, that in 1975, the Biltmore was not the opulent grand dame that she is today.

From 1942 to 1968, the Biltmore was repurposed, initially as a military hospital, and then as Miami's V.A. Hospital. As a result of these conversions, "many of the windows were sealed with concrete, and the marble floors covered with government-issued linoleum" (<a href="http://en.wikipedia.org">http://en.wikipedia.org</a>). In addition, the Biltmore's signature pool was drained and ravaged by disuse and the passage of time. The Biltmore sat shuttered and decaying until its reopening in 1987 as the luxury hotel/resort that she is today.

Bottom line, our prom was held amid the detritus and dust of this once esteemed property—AND without any air conditioning during the humid days of South Florida's late spring. I believe our prom was the evening when the term, "hot mess," was coined. In retrospect, we should have capitalized on the unique aspects of the Biltmore at that time, including its haunting by the ghosts of Veterans who died there. This first reunion of approximately 50 Killian graduates who lived in the Richmond Heights area occurred in December of 1975. It was organized by Reunion Board member Warren Raulerson.

#### THE RICHMOND HEIGHTS REUNIONS

One of the first big reunions of Killian graduates took place in December of 1975 when nearly 50 classmates gathered in a rented building off U.S. 1 on an unusually cold evening. The meeting was organized by Warren Raulerson amongst his friends in the Richmond Heights area, a neighborhood often described as a "tight knit family." The reunions and parties continue until this day.

"A lot of us born in 1957 and 1958 grew up together, kindergarten through Killian," Warren said. "After we graduated, everyone went their own way. If we had a phone number, that was the only way we stayed in touch. Back then, we had committees for food, drinks, finances and a DJ. It was \$10 or \$15 each. We had a bank account and put down the money to hold the building we rented."

Warren also played a role in starting the first Killian Class of 1975 Reunion that was open to all graduates. "Warren organized the first meeting at Killian to discuss it," said Carol Carver Harris, who chaired our first 10-Year reunion in 1985 and every reunion that followed it over the next 20 years.

Warren savors his high school years at Killian, where he enjoyed interacting with classmates, teachers and coaches. "I wouldn't mind living it over again," he said. "I wouldn't change anything."



Seems that everything old is new again!





# **COUGARS ROARED! THE VOTES HAVE BEEN COUNTED!**

It was a landslide victory. The nostalgic choice prevailed. Please mark your calendars for our 50th Reunion on June 12-15, 2025 in Dade/Broward County. The Miami area won with a total of 68 votes, compared to 24 for Tampa and 23 for Orlando. June won with 53 votes, compared to 33 for April and 28 for May. In total, 120 votes were recorded from 213 registered classmates (56%). Five people did not express a clear choice.

The vote highlighted a divergence between traditionalists, who wanted the Reunion in the Miami area (68), compared to classmates who wanted a fresh destination (47). It highlighted a desire to move to a cooler month, too, with 53 voting for June versus 61 voting for April or May. Despite these differences, the prevailing sentiment conveyed by everyone who expressed an opinion is that they are coming to the Reunion no matter what date or venue.

## **REUNION BOARD NAMES HOTEL FINALISTS**

During your Reunion Board meeting on July 25th, the 15 volunteers planning your 50-Year Celebration took another step forward to meet their goal of hosting the biggest and best class reunion we've ever had. By unanimous consent, they approved a "short list" of convention hotels proposed by the Site Selection Committee. The hotels vying to host our event were boiled down to just five properties, from a list that once included 28 contenders.

The short list was the product of five months of scrutiny that began in February when we asked classmates on our private Facebook page where to hold the Reunion. During an email election on April 1-9, when 120 of 213 registered classmates cast a ballot, Miami/Ft. Lauderdale catapulted to first place, beating both Tampa and Orlando combined. Three potential reunion dates were narrowed down to June 12-15, 2025, matching up exactly with the date we graduated on June 13, 1975.

A hotel request for proposal (RFP) was drafted next. The process relied upon a Facebook poll in June where more than 100 classmates expressed program preferences that dictated our facility needs. A final draft was ratified by the Reunion Board on July 2nd, and then distributed to every hotel in Dade and Broward counties with at least 235 rooms under \$250 per night, with ballroom space for at least 260 people for our evening events. In all, 28 properties received our RFP on July 8-9.

With help from the Greater Miami Convention & Visitors Bureau and Visit Fort Lauderdale, we found 11 hotels with sufficient inventory to submit a bid by our July 19th deadline. The submissions were analyzed by the Site Selection Committee, which selected five finalists on July 21st.

- Friday, June 13, 2025, Noon 1:30 p.m.
- Saturday, June 14, 2025, Noon 1:30 p.m.

Open daily from 11:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m., and a mere 4-minute walk from our hotel, we could have a nostalgic barbecue fix as often as we wanted, too!

#### Shorty's Place in Miami's History

Mr. E.L. "Shorty" Allen left Georgia as a young man more than 80 years ago. In 1951, he built and opened the familiar log cabin style restaurant, including family size picnic tables, screen windows and a concrete floor. Since those early days, Shorty's has been satisfying appetites with its famous ribs, chicken, homemade sauce, creamy coleslaw and corn on the cob. Shorty died in 2013 at the age of 104. Who said eating barbecue was bad for you?

Loyal patrons were shocked when Shorty's burned down in 1972. Thankfully, two years later, Shorty rebuilt an almost identical building on this same location—this time with air-conditioning. Shorty's continues to be an "Oasis in Time," where you can taste what it was like in South Florida over 73 years ago.



Today the restaurant remains a piece of South Florida's glorious history, a nostalgic and delicious landmark next door to Datran Center Skyscrapers, and the southern end of MetroRail, all just a block from Dadeland Mall.<sup>1</sup>

#### **Nothing Lasts Forever**

Over the years, Shorty's BBQ has been approached many times by developers seeking to buy the restaurant's original location in Miami. The response was typically a quick, "No," said CEO Mark Vasturo. However, the barbecue eatery finally said "yes" in 2022, after roughly a year of negotiations. A sale-leaseback with Shorty's was arranged, which allows it to remain on its original site through 2027. The restaurant could then be demolished or part of a future development on the site.<sup>2</sup> Who knows? Never say never, but Shorty's might be nearing the end of its historic run in Kendall. Killian's Class of '75 Reunion Board invited everyone to saddle-up to a picnic table and enjoy a taste of nostalgia. It might have been your last opportunity to experience this Miami institution!

## Ron Ehmann

### He Was A Class Guy With Coaches and Students

"HE HAD just come from our All-Sports Banquet where he had really put on a great performance. He was the Master of Ceremonies, and he stole the show. But I knew he'd do it, he always did."

That's how Killian's Head football coach, Chris Vagotis, remembered Ron Ehmann this morning.

Ehmann, 34, head of Killian's Physical Education Department, was killed earlier this morning when the car be was driving was struck by another automobile. He died instantly.

"He was the kind of guy who just overwhelmed you with his galety and love of life," continued Vagetis, "He was just a great human being."

Vagotis remembered Ehmann easily. Not only were they good friends, but his career at Killian had been almost parallel.

"We both started here in 1971," he said. "Ron went into biology and P.E., and also acted as an assistant football coach. We worked together alot and he started our weight training program. He was so enthusiastic about it that he got other people caught up. We've now got about \$50,000 worth of equipment; and it's all thanks to

AN OFFSHOOT of the unique weight training program was Killian's successful participation in the Marine Corps Physical Fitness Test. Ehmann had led six of Killian's top athletes through the rigors of the tests to a first place finish in Florida, and a second place finish in the Southeast. He was to have accompanied his team to Washington on Wednesday for the national competition.

Ehmann was also responsible for the development of a weight training program for girls. Dubbed 'the superchicks', the program was the first of "He was really some kind of guy. We its kind in Dade County.

A graduate of Fort Scott Junior College and Kansas State University, Ehmann came to Miami in 1968 where he worked as a physical education teacher for Miami Springs High School. After transferring to Killian in 1971, he worked as a biology and physical education teacher before taking over as the head of the P.E. Department last year.

His wife, Jimmy, is a teacher at Riviera Junior High.

EHMANN TOOK a personal interest in his students that went beyond the usual limitations. One student, football player-wrestler Chris Gosselin, who was beset by family problems this year, was taken into the Ehmann's home.

"HE TREATED him like a son," said wrestling coach Chuck Almeida. are all going to miss him.

Defensive coach Fred Cooley remembered him as a "guy who was really involved. He spent unnumbered hours of his free time trying to promote the school and the kids, and he never got anything in return.

The students at the school who knew Ehmann were distraught at the news "You can't believe how down the kids are," said offensive football coach Fred Burnside. "They were really close to him."

WORKING WITH the weight training program. Ehmann got to meet most of the students. It's a mandatory part of the physical education pro-gram now, due in large part to Ehmann, himself.

"He was number one in every way," said Vagotis. "If you were ever going to hand out a medal for a class guy, he would win in every sense of the word."

MariaElena Galdo: I remember Coach Ehmann as such an all around decent and inspiring person. It's really great that his memorial park (next to Killian) is still there to keep his memory alive.

Kristal Bentley Hickmon: A sad time! His death rocked us all. #RIP

Mary T. McCullagh: His death was the first in my life, and writing this elegy was my way of navigating the pain and loss.

**Kathleen Miller:** We will always remember him. What a beautiful tribute to a wonderful man. I've often wondered what happened to his wife. My father was an associate pastor at the church where Coach Ehman's funeral was held. He counselled Mrs. Ehman a lot after Coach died. Daddy said she had a very difficult time dealing with it.

Leslie Armstrong Mulherin: Science was not my favorite subject throughout my educational journey. Then I had him for biology and loved that class and still remember things I learned.

**Bruce Orr:** A real teacher to the students. He built the best weight training program in Dade County for all people and athletes bar none, and it was copied by every school.

Leslie Miles Wan: I distinctly remember the day they announced his death. I believe the teachers had already been told, but it came over the loudspeaker and the teacher in the class I was in started crying again. Death wasn't something I had known much of at that point in my life, so it was really shocking and sad. Creating that park was a wonderful tribute to him and his family.

## A Moment I Will Never Forget By Michael Bell

The mid-70s were a very different time. Most notably, teenagers could legally drink at the age of 18-years-old. Many of our fellow seniors could go to bars and lawfully imbibe for most of their final year in high school. A common workaround for those of us with summer and fall birthdays—who were waiting impatiently to turn 18—was the use of a "borrowed" ID. They worked because Florida's driver's licenses had yet to include photos, thereby making it impossible for barkeepers to match faces to pictures. In my case, the borrowed ID was my older brother's driver's license.

We also frequented places that were lax about carding customers. And the Sunset Lounge was one of them.

One evening, following our shift working at the Kendall Twin Cinema, a group of us headed to the Sunset Lounge to cool our jets with a few after-work beers and a pocketful of quarters for jukebox plays. We walked into the joint like regulars—lest we looked like the minors we were—ordered a round of beers and sat down at a table. Tossing back our beers, 70s favorites filled the air. We scanned the nearly empty bar for familiar faces. And we found one. At the far end of the bar, nursing a beer, shrouded in the darkness, was Dr. Arahill, the principal of our high school!

We were busted. But to bolt out the door would've been an obvious and blatant admission of guilt—so we stayed, frozen with that knowledge, acting as if there was nothing out of the ordinary with our youthful presence at the Sunset Lounge. Interestingly, Dr. Arahill stayed as well, completely ignoring us while he ordered another. Shortly, we finished our round and executed an Irish exit.

I remember not sleeping well that night. I was certain that I would be summoned to the principal's office upon arrival at Killian the next morning. I shuddered each time the PA would cut-in throughout the day. By the end of that very long day? Crickets. Nothing.

Dr. Arahill was a smart man, and being that the bar was nearly empty, he certainly had to have seen us. Like us, it was after hours for him. But most importantly, it was the unthinkable, and he had the wisdom to make sure that the unthinkable remained unmentionable. Life-lesson exemplified!

NOTE: The since-closed Sunset Lounge was located in a strip mall known as Dade Western Center, on the southwest corner of Sunset Drive and SW 117th Avenue. It has since been replaced with a T. J. Maxx-anchored shopping plaza.



### IN MEMORIUM



We celebrated during the Reunion, but our hearts were heavy from the absence of 170 of our cherished classmates no longer with us. They were part of our journey, shaping memories that still resonate in our lives. Their laughter, friendship, and spirit remain woven into the fabric of who we are. It seemed only right to offer a peaceful Memorial Room to honor them. It was open 24 hours per day. Classmates could visit anytime to pay their respects.

The Memorial Room included a poster with the names of our deceased classmates, along with an arrangement of white flowers, LED candles and a collection of ring-binder notebooks. The Memorial Committee provided blank

cards and pens to record memories and thoughts about loved ones, too. Another table held flower seed packets to take home and plant with love, in order to grow more happy memories.

The binders were labeled from A-Z, with a plastic sleeve inside for each classmate. The sleeves held a page about each person, including their date of birth, date of death, a high school picture and an obituary (when available). The sleeves allowed classmates to share and leave behind the thoughts they wrote down. The goal was to tell everyone who looked at the binders about our classmates lives, as if they were telling us about themselves. We will preserve the notebooks and their contents for future reunions.



Online obituaries were linked to classmate names so they were readily available and easy to find. When military service was discovered, it was noted with a small flag (see "Key" below). 




